Thematic Units - Fourth Grade

Big Picture: How do we get to heaven to be with the Lord?

Fourth grade focuses on morality, with units on the Ten Commandments, Beatitudes, virtues and corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

The general theme of the year is "How can I get to heaven?" with the answer "By knowing, loving and serving God in this life and being happy with him in the next."

- Red is review of material which was previously taught.

Prayer and Spirituality through the year - How do I pray as I grow up?

Prayer is integrated throughout the year.

Goals and themes:

Learning more about how to pray on one's own.

Reinforcing an effective way to examine one's conscience.

Continuing to learn the discipline of meditation.

Unit one - How do I live in relationship with God?

Goals and themes:

Explore the beginning stories of the Old Testament and begin to see one's place in creation.

Understand that God wants to establish a relationship with each person.

Begin to understand the idea of covenant.

Begin to recognize the great things that God has done for people - especially in the story of the Exodus.

Learn about Original Sin.

Unit two - What are the Ten Commandments?

Goals and themes:

Seeing the Commandments as a response to a loving God - living as God wants us to do. Seeing the Commandments as a help and a guide to getting to heaven.

Learning how the Commandments help us to know, love and serve God better.

Memorizing the Ten Commandments.

 - Third commandment: Catholics must attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days, refrain from unnecessary work and perform works of mercy. (§ 2181, 2185)
 - ► Fourth commandment:
 - ♦ Children must respect and love their parents and those of authority over them. (§ 2217);
 - ♦ Parents and those in authority must respect and love their children. (§ 2222)
 - Fifth commandment:
 - ♦ Human life is sacred from its beginning. God alone is the Lord of life from its beginning until its end. (§ 2258)
 - ♦ Murder the deliberate killing of a person is a serious offence against the law of God. (§ 2261, 2268-2269, 2320)
 - ♦ We are called to protect and promote the life and dignity of all persons. (§ 2334, 2393)
 - Sixth commandment: Adultery refers to marital infidelity. Adultery is an injustice. Whoever commits adultery fails in their marriage commitment.(§ 2380, 2381) Students at this age can phrase this "When you are married, you don't date other people." That is enough of an explanation and one that they easily understand.
 - Seventh commandment:
 - ♦ Stealing is an offense against God's Law and the rights of private property. (§ 2401)

- This commandment also obliges us to justice and charity in the care and distribution of earthly goods, and the fruits of human labor. (§ 2401)
- ► Eighth commandment: Lying about others and ourselves is an offence against the truth and God's Law. (§ 2464)
- Ninth and tenth commandments: Greed and jealously are an offence against others and God's Law. (§ 2534, 2536, 2552)

Goals and themes:

Learning about the Beatitudes and how they can help one become a better disciple.

Being able to identify the Beatitudes as they are lived out in the lives of the saints.

Memorize the Beatitudes.

Explore other parables and the Lord's Prayer as guides that Jesus gave us to help us become holy.

Discovering the ways that God helps us through the gift of the Spirit to live a moral life.

More exploration of the nature of sin - and how to avoid it.

Discovering how the church helps us to live the moral life.
