Thematic Units - Seventh Grade

The Big Picture: Jesus died and rose to save us.

Seventh Grade consists of two modules: Christian morality and Jesus and discipleship. The first module will help lay the foundation for a discussion about living a moral life and give the students information about the Church's guidance in moral decision-making. The second module will give a survey of the life of Jesus as it is told to us in the gospels, and also pose the challenge of discipleship to the students. Is following Jesus, and letting that govern the choices in their lives, a decision that they are ready to make?

Prayer and Spirituality through the year - How do I grow closer to Jesus in prayer?

Prayer is integrated throughout the year.

Becoming a independent person of prayer, who can pray through the day using the methods taught over the previous years.

Learning to meditate on Scripture, using Ignatian mediation.

Use the story of Chiara Luce in Ablaze to illustrate the effects of a life of prayer on a Christian.

Unit one - What does it mean to believe, to be a person of faith and a disciple?

Goals and themes:

Review the meaning of discipleship and establish this theme as the context for the year Explore what it means to be a person of faith

Establish that faith is the ground for how we live our lives

Use the story of Alphonsa in *Ablaze* to illustrate how deciding to be a disciple is a life-changing experience.

Unit two - What do we believe about Jesus?

Goals and themes:

In depth exploration of one of the Gospels (usually Mark or Luke)

Familiarity with the other three Gospels and the teachings about Jesus found in the New Testament

Being able to articulate the central importance of Jesus as Lord to our faith as Catholics Use the story of Pedro Calungsod in *Ablaze* to illustrate the impetus to share one's faith in Christ.

Unit three - What is the life of a disciple?

Goals and themes:

A review of the Commandments, Beatitudes and virtues

A deeper understanding of the demands of discipleship in the life a Christian

An appreciation for the integrity of church teaching, particularly with regards to life issues and human sexuality.

The capacity to integrate one's prayer life with one's moral behavior.

Use the story of Dominic Savio in *Ablaze* to illustrate the capacity to provide a good example to one's peers.
