Follow the Labyrinth through Lent

The Labyrinth, an ancient symbol of life's journey, differs from a maze, which has dead ends. A labyrinth has only one path to follow. In the medieval period, the labyrinth became popular among Christians as a way to make a pilgrimage when one could not travel to a holy site. Many cathedrals had labyrinths (this one is from the cathedral at Chartres). Pilgrimages were also ways to show repentance for sin, so a Lenten labyrinth is an appropriate way for your household to mark the days toward Easter. Activities: Start at Ash Wednesday, and as you travel through the season of Lent, color in the path your household will follow toward Easter. Notice the persons you will meet during your Lenten journey, and consider doing some of the activities found along the way.
